

In 1942 both Harold and George were drafted into the U.S. Army Air Force and were stationed in England. World War II gave the Smathers Band a whole new repertoire. I loved when we did these Hi-Wi-Yan Numbers!! But to tell the truth, I never could tell what those Hawaiians were singing. When we got ready to record this, I searched the internet for the lyrics. But alas, I could never get all of those syllables to fit without hearing them sung. Luckily, I found a great video of the famous (or is it infamous?) "Cowboy" Jack Clement singing the song replete with ukulele and Aloha shirt. Turns out our producer, Mark Howard, had recorded the track!! Even better, while we

8. Miller Blues

This was a tune that the band learned in the 1930's from the playing of Slim Miller and the Cumberland Ridge Runners. In 1937 the Smathers Band was asked to accompany the Champion Square Dancers at the National Folk Festival in Chicago. While in Chicago, the dancers were asked to perform on the popular WLS "National Barn Dance." Unfortunately, the Smathers Band was not allowed to play for the dancers as they did not belong to the musicians union. But, they did get to meet Slim Miller and that almost made up for being excluded from performing on the famed radio program. This one is especially for Daphne Queen Smathers, Harold's wife of over 50 years.

9. Up A Lazy River

12. Sweet Sue, Just You

When Josh and Amanda were about 15, they started to become familiar with Luke's music through Hilary Dirlam, a local musician who was working with high school students teaching them traditional music of the region. Josh and Amanda,

along with Adam Landers, did this song in their band. Hilary played bass with the band after Bea Smathers passed away.

13. Cacklin' Hen

We would play this tune every year at The Mountain Dance and Folk Festival in Asheville. Part of the tradition included eggs rolling on the stage when the fiddle made the hen cackle! Every year the audience looked forward to this part of the show.

In the 1930's, The Champion Fibre Company, where Luke, Harold and George were employed, hired a band director and offered music lessons to its employees. Luke took up the trumpet, George the clarinet, Harold the trombone and Quay the tuba. This is one of the songs they learned from sheet music and played in the Champion Concert Band.

15. Darkness On The Delta

16. The Waltz You Saved For Me

Luke Smathers died July 17, 1997. His funeral was a celebration of the music he loved. Several members of the community came together to play at his service, including veteran guitar player Leonard Hollifield and the latest generation of musicians which included Josh Goforth, Amanda Luther and Adam Landers. This was the last song I sang for Luke.
